

Name of research project:	Piloting a Total WSH Services Centre in Singapore
Background/Rationale	In Finland and South Korea, the accessibility of workers to occupational health management services had led to better health outcomes and work ability. In 2017, the Singapore Workplace Safety and Health (WSH) Institute commenced a pilot project to study the benefits in providing Total WSH services in a cluster setting to the occupants at Woodlands East Industrial Estate for a period of two years. Total WSH is a holistic and integrated approach to manage the interaction between work, safety and health so as to promote the wellbeing of workers. The estate comprised three blocks of flatted factories which were mainly small and medium sized enterprises (SMEs).
Study Objectives and Design	The pilot study seeks to find out the following: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • benefits, success factors and challenges in the provision of the Total WSH services • level of WSH knowledge, attitude and practices before and end of the study period • interventions that are practical, scalable and sustainable in improving WSH performance and work productivity
